FALL 2022: BIG WINS AND MILESTONES

It has been a fun and eventful first semester for the H.I.R.E.D! Program! We have reached many milestones, and we are just getting started.

Grant Goals:

As a reminder, the most important goals of the H.I.R.E.D! Program are:

- To give students increased exposure to and understanding of the career opportunities that are available in Northwest Arkansas.
- To expose students to the pathways needed for various careers.
- To help students start down the pathway to their desired career, whether it requires college, technical school, apprenticeship or on the job training.

The above goals are being met in several ways. Here are a few ways we are increasing exposure to career opportunities and exposing students to the pathways for those careers:

- Individual Career Coaching and Career Research
- Online Career Seminars by industry professionals (Zooms with professionals in various fields that are in the form of breakouts for students to choose)
- Face to face guest speaking by industry professionals
- Industry tours
- Job shadowing opportunities
- Internship opportunities
- Youth Apprenticeships
- Teacher summer externships

The goal of having students start down the pathway to their chosen career is being accomplished by:

- Coaching students about CTE classes and technical programs available to them and about college classes they can take during high school.
- Placing students into paid youth apprenticeships which end with industry credentials.
- Placing students into paid or unpaid internships to learn job skills needed for future success.


Here are some of the milestones we have hit along the way:

- Coaches have met with over 650 students individually
- Coaches have met with over 2,000 students in small group or classroom settings.
- We have hosted 2 career seminars with a total of 29 industry professionals for students to choose from.
 - Over 160 teachers and 1800 students participated in each seminar and we have 3 more seminars to come.
 - We have launched our YouTube Channel with recordings of our Career Seminars to direct students to later. You can visit the channel <u>here</u> or search "hired career seminar" on YouTube.
- Connected over 1100 students (some multiple times) with industry professionals through quest speakers, tours and career events.
- Had over 2,000 students attend college events like financial aid nights, college visits, guest speakers from colleges and universities.
- Placed 28 students into both paid and unpaid internships and many more into job shadowing opportunities.
- Secured 30 paid youth apprenticeships. Some have started, others start this summer.
- Placed 17 teachers in teacher externships (last summer).
- Perhaps our greatest accomplishment has been building the capacity of our coaches to grow students and give them tremendous opportunities that, without the H.I.R.E.D!
 Program, they would not have had. I am SO proud of this team's work!

LINCOLN HIGH SCHOOL SENIOR: GRANT KING

Grant King is a senior at Lincoln High School. Last year, he was recruited by Nabholz during the Build My Future event. Nabholz Construction recognized his work ethic and skill and offered him a job. He worked a summer internship and has been offered full-time employment upon graduation. Career Coach, Sarah Simmons has had Nabholz recruiters come to Lincoln to visit with other students since then working toward getting other students opportunities at Nabholz Construction.

Next Steps for the H.I.R.E.D! Program:

In addition to continuing the exploratory experiences with college and careers that we have offered students this fall, we will also be seeking additional internships and youth apprenticeships for our students who prefer that route to their chosen profession over attending college. We will also be starting work on teacher externships for this coming summer. Our biggest events of the spring will be multiple hiring events where we bring graduating students and employers together to find jobs suitable to the students' future needs. Some will be opportunities to work while in college, others will be full time work in the fields students are entering. Many of these jobs will be apprenticeships in the skilled trades. We will also be hosting signing days at each high school for students who have have been placed in a full time job leading to a professional career. Lastly, we will be helping underclassmen work on their schedules for next year helping them determine which classes are a best fit for their futures, and helping seniors make any final preparations for college or technical school next year.

We are very excited about the work that is going on in each school district with our students. We truly feel that we are helping students set positive trajectories for their futures, and the best part is that we are just getting started!
